



HOW TO RESEARCH A COMPANY Research Network Tip Sheet

The Research Network frequently gets requests from clients for background information on a company. While we have fee-based resources that we can use to search for background material, these free websites can help you gather information as well.

When researching a company, it is best to have **as much information as possible**. Sometimes there are a number of businesses with almost identical names. While a business name may be enough, an address (or at least city and state) and executive name can help refine the search results. **Don't** rely solely on just one resource. Use them together & see if a pattern emerges.

Better Business Bureau (<u>www.bbb.org</u>) - Listings for local businesses by ZIP code, business name, or phone number. Note that members might get a more favorable rating than nonmembers.

NYS Dept of State - Division of Corporations (www.dos.ny.gov/corps/bus_entity_search.html) -

Search corporate filings in NY. Tip: Search for a company, then search the executive name(s) to see whether they hold ownership stake in other, similar-sounding businesses (also can be done on the BBB website). For other states, go to www.coordinatedlegal.com/SecretaryOfState.html.

Federal Trade Commission (<u>www.ftc.gov/bcp/menus/consumer/invest.shtm</u>) - Literature on how to avoid being defrauded by franchise & business opportunities, investment schemes, or work-at-home offers.

SEC (<u>www.sec.gov/edgar.shtml</u>) - All public companies are required to file registration statements, periodic reports, and other forms electronically through EDGAR. Anyone can access and download this information for free.

NYS Attorney General (<u>www.ag.ny.gov/investor-protection/franchisors-franchisees</u>) - Provides a phone number that can be called to find out whether a complaint has been filed in connection with a specific franchise.

Entrepreneur Magazine Franchise Buying Guide (<u>www.entrepreneur.com/franzone/allabout/</u>) - Articles from the magazine that focus on researching franchise opportunities.

News - Use the Google News aggregator (<u>http://news.google.com</u>) to find stories. Make sure the "news" is not just a press release.

TheFunded.com - Research, rate, and review venture capital sources worldwide.

Executives - LinkedIn, Whois.com, etc. provide additional information on a company's executive. You can also create a Google alert for future information.

Tips

- Certain websites (i.e. Ripoff Report) provide a forum for reporting complaints about companies. However, know that this site (and others like it) allows a company to pay to have complaints removed.
- Social media can be helpful too. Find industry forums, limit your Google search to blogs, search Twitter, or use a
 social media search aggregator like <u>Social Mention</u> to find out what people think about the company. You can
 also use <u>Social Mention</u> to create a social media alert for a company or executive.
- Search Google Maps to get a street view of the address provided to see what businesses the company shares a space with. Or, in some cases, you can see that there is no business at that physical location.
